Power of Team

U.S. Women's cross-country duo make history, win gold at Winter Olympics

"We are dreamers. But we are also believers. It's crazy how much confidence you can get from a teammate's success if you allow yourself to stand beside them." – Sadie Bjornsen

Just 24 hours ago, Kikkan Randall and Jesse Diggins won gold medals in the team sprint freestyle cross-country skiing final at PyeongChang – the first Olympic gold medal for the Americans in nordic ski

the Americans in nordic ski history.

The win is a victory for the entire women's cross-country team that has focused on team spirit for more than a decade in the most solitary of winter sports. The remarkable jour-ney of this American team can be summed up in three words— purpose, perseverance and patience.

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More than a decade in the making, the Team USA women's cross-country ski team – with three Dartmost successful season yet.
